

BARRIERS TO EMPLOYMENT FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES: A SOCIO-LEGAL STUDY IN INDIA

This research paper investigates the socio-legal barriers faced by persons with disabilities (PWD) in accessing employment opportunities in India. Despite legislative frameworks aimed at promoting equality and inclusion, PWD continue to encounter significant challenges in the job market. This study employs a mixed-methods approach, combining qualitative interviews with quantitative data analysis to explore the experiences of PWD in various sectors. The findings reveal systemic discrimination, lack of awareness, and inadequate implementation of existing laws as key obstacles. The paper concludes with recommendations for policy reforms and enhanced support systems to facilitate the employment of PWD.

OBJECTIVES:

3. **Lack of Awareness:** Many employers are unaware of the legal obligations to provide reasonable accommodations for PWD. This lack of awareness contributes to a hostile work environment and limits opportunities for career advancement.

4. **Infrastructural Barriers:** Physical accessibility remains a significant issue in many workplaces. Inadequate facilities, such as ramps and accessible restrooms, hinder the ability of PWD to perform their jobs effectively.
5. **Case Studies:** Qualitative interviews with PWD reveal personal experiences of discrimination, challenges in job searching, and the impact of supportive policies. These narratives highlight the need for systemic change.

Case Study: "Experiences of Persons with Disabilities in Employment"

Location: Various cities in India

Overview: This case study includes interviews with ten individuals with disabilities from different backgrounds and sectors, including IT, education, and manufacturing.

Findings:

- Participants reported facing discrimination during the hiring process, with many being overlooked for positions despite having the necessary qualifications.
- Several individuals highlighted the lack of reasonable accommodations in their workplaces, which affected their productivity and job satisfaction.
- Supportive measures, such as mentorship programs and inclusive workplace policies, were identified as crucial for enhancing employment opportunities.
- Participants expressed a desire for greater awareness and training among employers regarding the capabilities of PWD.

Case Study 2: "The Struggles of Visually Impaired Individuals in the IT Sector"

Location: Bangalore, Karnataka

Overview: This case study focuses on the experiences of visually impaired individuals seeking employment in the Information Technology (IT) sector, which is often perceived as a promising field for PWD due to its reliance on technology.

Findings:

Participants reported facing significant challenges during the recruitment process, including a lack of awareness among employers about assistive technologies that can facilitate the employment of visually impaired individuals.

Many candidates were discouraged by the perception that they would not be able to perform effectively in a fast-paced IT environment.

Despite having relevant qualifications, several individuals faced rejection based on preconceived notions about their capabilities.

Supportive measures, such as internships and mentorship programs, were identified as crucial for enhancing employability and confidence among visually impaired candidates.

Case Study 3: "Employment Challenges for Persons with Intellectual Disabilities"

Location: Mumbai, Maharashtra

Overview: This case study examines the barriers faced by individuals with intellectual disabilities in securing employment in various sectors, including retail and hospitality.

Findings:

Participants reported a lack of understanding and acceptance from employers regarding their abilities and potential contributions to the workforce.

Many individuals with intellectual disabilities faced challenges in communication during interviews, which negatively impacted their chances of being hired.

The study highlighted the importance of job coaching and tailored training programs to prepare individuals for the workforce.

Employers who had previously hired individuals with intellectual disabilities reported positive experiences, emphasizing the need for awareness campaigns to promote inclusivity.

Case Study 4: "Women with Disabilities in the Workforce"

Location: Ahmedabad, Gujarat
